What an amazing summer we've had here in Lake Tahoe! The weather's been pretty fantastic; the wildflowers are amazing; the streams are running full into August. It's been a pretty amazing summer so far here at The Village Church as well. We are on track to host over a hundred kids at our VBS next week, we're on track to start our K-1 school program here on August 21, and, oh yeah, we have raised the funds to buy the house across the driveway and most of what we need to refurbish the church! There's been a ton going on here as staff and volunteers have put in all kinds of hard work and extra hours to make all this possible. This church has a history of pulling together and pulling off some amazing ministry.

Just today I found one of the bulletins from the dedication service for our sanctuary from July 10, 1966. It gives a brief history of the founding of the church in 1964 and then the work to get a building built. I was struck that the Building Fund Campaign was put on in June of '65 and construction started by September. The first service was held in the new sanctuary on May 8, 1966. Our church will be 60 next year and our sanctuary will be 58! The write-up in the bulletin ends with these words, "Now with our own building, we must develop a creative program for the enrichment of children, youth, and adults to the glory of God, and for the service of man." As we prepare to move into the house across the driveway and put it to use in ministry for the Kingdom of God, I think those words are a pretty good summary of what we hope to achieve. Please pray for the further growth of ministry and service here at The Village Church, for our leaders and staff, and for everyone God will call to join us.




One Collective

Our congregation through the Missions Committee has been supporting the Watkins family (see picture below) for several years. They are associated with the mission organization, *One Collective*, and have focused their ministry efforts for two decades on Muslims in the Middle East. Wes grew up in the Tahoe/Reno area and attended UNR.

One Collective's vision is to see lives and communities around the world transformed by the power of God. Its mission is to bring people together to help the oppressed by serving as a catalyst to bring churches, businesses and schools together to serve oppressed people around the world.

Wes and his wife Rachel served for eight years in Yemen – the world's most unreached country – before moving to Lebanon for six years where Wes taught at the Arab Baptist Theological Seminary which is dedicated to training Arab world leaders from all over the Middle East. Rachel, by then the mother of three young children, home schooled the kids and ministered to women in the Syrian refugee camps in Lebanon. The Watkins left Beirut in July 2022 to return to the US and give their children the experience of living and studying in the US. They are now living in Wheaton, IL, a suburb of Chicago -- the home of 300,000 Muslims.

Rachel, a trained nurse, works in the medical field while Wes remains on the faculty of the Beirut seminary focusing on writing and teaching remotely to train students from Sudan, Lebanon, and other Arab Muslim countries. He travels extensively and last year extended his outreach to the Muslim population in India and Bangladesh. This year he is scheduled to travel to the Ivory Coast, Indonesia, and back to the Middle East surveying church movements and training church planters. He also mentors and coaches indigenous missionaries throughout the Muslim world, volunteers with World Relief in Chicago to help with the settlement of Sudanese and Syrian refugees, and continues doing research, speaking at conferences on church planting among the unreached people groups, and teaching on mission movements around the world. Wes and Rachel hope to move to Dubai



on the Arab Peninsula in 6-7 years after their kids are out of high school.

The Missions Committee supports the Watkins as one of our missionary families annually and encourages members of our congregation to pray for them and the people groups they serve in hostile areas of the world. 
